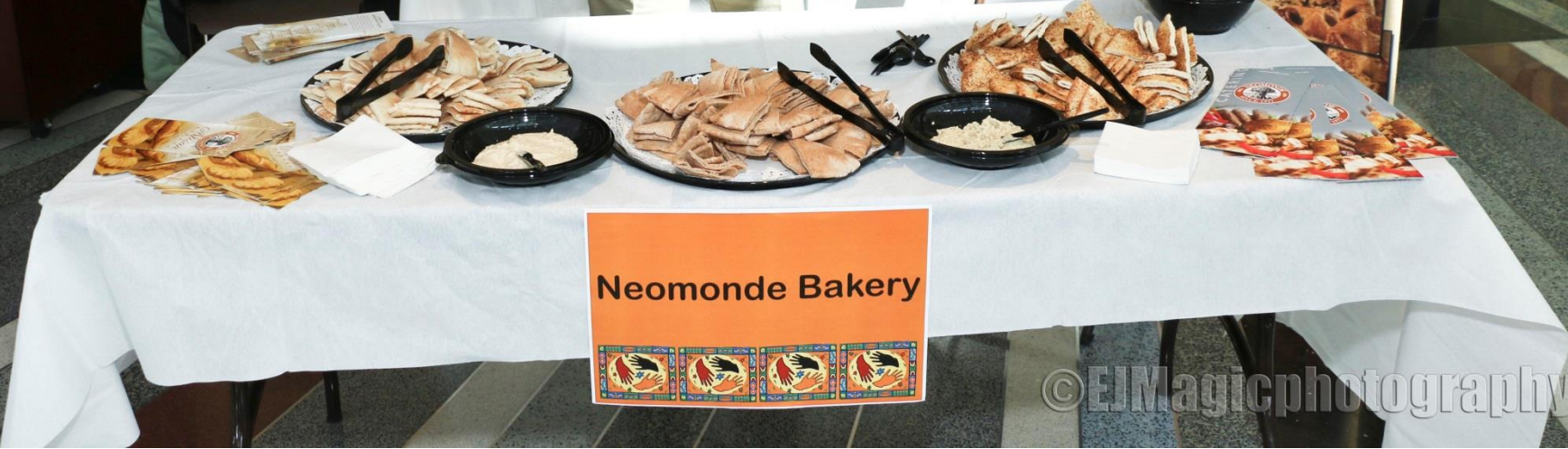

Some key points to remember ...

- Poverty is not a race or ethnic issue.
- Poverty is a social and cultural issue.
- Economic class is a continuous line, not a clear cut distinction.
- Generational and structural poverty are different.

Poverty in social, emotional and mental health

- Social: Isolation, lack of support, stigma
- Emotional: Anxiety, depression, low self-esteem
- Mental: Cognitive impairment, memory loss

## AROUND THE WORLD


The oldest known tattooed human remains are those of a 5,300-year-old man from the Neolithic period. He had several dark, geometric tattoos on his arms and legs, which are thought to be the earliest form of body art.

The first tattoo in the United States was made in 1829 by Samuel O'Reilly, an Irish immigrant, who got a tattoo of a harp on his arm.
